Faithful Scribe's Script

SK Faithful Scribe Joe O'Connor: Catholics often wonder what happened to Mary, our Blessed Mother, after Jesus' Crucifixion. The article on page 2 explores what she did and where she lived up until the time of her Assumption. Mary is covered the most in the Gospel of Luke. (Did you ever wonder where Luke gained his accounts of the Infancy Narrative? Most likely it was first-hand accounts from our Blessed Mother. [See The Chosen's "The Messengers" episode of Mary giving her accounts of the Annunciation and the Nativity to Luke.]) The Acts of the Apostles is considered the second Gospel of Luke. In it, Luke (Acts 1: 12-14) mentioned that Mary was with the Apostles in the Upper Room (Cenacle). praying. The Apostles were honored that Mary, the mother of Jesus, was praying with them. She played no role like Peter; rather, her role was the discipleship of prayer. (In her many apparitions, she has always urged those to whom she appeared to pray.) She is regarded by the Church as the Queen of the Apostles. Ave Maria!

Blessed Father McGivney's Feast Day is August 13.

Faithful Navigator's Log (Continued)

SK Faithful Navigator Jesus Quintanar: [continued] Mary served as the Church's heart and soul, always encouraging the Apostles and others to pray. (That's why one of Mary's many titles is Queen of the Apostles.) It is noteworthy that in all of Mary's many apparitions, she has always urged those to whom she appeared to pray. There is no better vehicle of prayer than the Rosary! We also learn from Blessed Catherine's account that Mary was assumed bodily into Heaven, although it was not in the dramatic fashion as Jesus. Instead, in her quiet way, she was raised up into Heaven, as the Apostles found out the day after her entombment. In August, as we celebrate Blessed Father Michael McGivney's Feast Day on August 13, let us also rededicate ourselves to our Blessed Mother, who as Our Lady of Guadalupe is the Patroness of the Knights of Columbus. Vivat Jesus!

Blessed Anne Catherine Emmerich She was born in 1774 into a poor farming

family in Westphalia, Germany. She had a limited education but it was noticed that she was especially drawn to prayer. When words from prayers were recited, she would have visions, e.g., when "Glory be to the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit" was said, she would see the Holy Trinity in Heaven. At a young age, she thought at first that everyone could see them but when she recounted what she said, the other children would make fun of her so she kept her visions to herself. As she grew older, she worked on a large farm and later as a seamstress. In 1802 at the age of 28, she joined the Augustinian nuns. In 1811, she began to suffer illnesses and great pain that she would endure the rest of her life. In 1813, she received the stigmata but in 1818 the wounds to her hands and feet healed. At that time she developed a Y-shaped cross on her breastbone similar to a cross at a local church. She also developed wounds on her head akin to Christ's crown of thorns. During her last five years of life, a writer recorded all of her visions beginning with Adam up to Jesus and Mary. She died in 1824. The process of her beatification began in 1892 by the local bishop. In 2004, she was beatified by St. John Paul II.

The last two references to Mary, our Blessed Mother, in Scripture were at the Crucifixion (John 19:26-27) and at Pentecost (Acts 1:13-14). What happened to Mary after that? Happily, at the very end of the 4-volume set entitled "The Life of Jesus Christ and Biblical Revelations." as told by Blessed Ann Catherine Emmerich [see inset below], 27 pages are devoted to Mary's life between the Crucifixion and her Assumption into Heaven. After Jesus' Ascension, Mary stayed with the Apostles in Jerusalem blessing them as they went forth and returned. After a few years, when Christian persecution flared up again, Mary allowed John to take her to a crossshaped stone house that he had built for her near Ephesus (see above). [In 1881 and 1891, Mary's house was discovered using the detailed description found in Blessed Catherine's last volume. It was found later that the little ruins (destroyed by the same earthquake that destroyed Ephesus in 262 AD) had been venerated for centuries by a distant mountain village populated by descendants of the Christians of Ephesus.] Pope Pius XII designated the house as a Holy Place and three Popes have visited it: Paul VI in 1967, John Paul II in 1979 and Francis in 2006.] Mary lived in one apartment and her maidservant in the other. She created a Crucifix and built 12 Stations of the Cross at each where she and her maidservant meditated and prayed. At the end of the Stations was a cave that represented Christ's Sepulcher (later her tomb). After three years, she visited Jerusalem and its Holy Places, and then returned to her home near Ephesus. One and one-half years before her death, she again visited Jerusalem and became deathly ill. She recovered and returned to Ephesus. Nearing death, she summoned the Apostles via prayer. Peter, John, Andrew, Simon, Jude Thaddeus and Matthias were present when she was anointed by Peter and given her last Holy Communion. She passed away in her house and Jesus welcomed her to Heaven. At the time of her death, it was 13 years after Christ's Ascension and 48 years after His Birth (she was 15 years old at the time), so she died at the age of 63. She was prepared for burial, placed into a casket, and carried to the cave by the six Apostles. The next day, Thomas, who had been in India, arrived and was heartbroken that he did not see Mary before she died. When the Apostles took Thomas to the cave and opened the casket, only her burial wraps in the shape of her body were found.
