What were the real reasons why slavery was given a pass in this important document? The Deleted Passage from the Declaration of Independence

He has waged cruel war against human nature itself, violating its most sacred rights of life and liberty in the persons of a distant people who never offended him, captivating & carrying them into slavery in another hemisphere or to incur miserable death in their transportation thither. This piratical warfare, the opprobrium of infidel powers, is the warfare of the Christian King of Great Britain. Determined to keep open a market where Men should be bought & sold, he has prostituted his negative for suppressing every legislative attempt to prohibit or restrain this execrable commerce. And that this assemblage of horrors might want no fact of distinguished die, he is now exciting those very people to rise in arms among us, and to purchase that liberty of which he has deprived them, by murdering the people on whom he has obtruded them: thus paying off former crimes committed again the Liberties of one people, with crimes which he urges them to commit against the lives of another. The Declaration of Independence and Slavery (The Committee of Five, Currier & Ives 1876)



Not widely known is that Founding Father Thomas Jefferson, in an early version of the Declaration of Independence, drafted a 168-word passage that condemned slavery as one of the many evils foisted upon the colonies by the British crown. (See inset below.) The passage was cut from the final wording. The question is "Why?" In 1776, slavery was legal in the British Empire, which outlawed the slave trade in 1807 and abolished slavery in 1833. While many of the Founding Fathers recognized that slavery violated the American Revolution's core ideal of liberty, their strong commitment to private property rights, principles of limited government, and regional harmony prevented them from making a bold move against slavery. More obviously, the considerable investment of Southern Founding Fathers in slave-based agriculture, along with their deep-seated racial prejudice, were substantial obstacles to emancipation. Also, Northern shipping merchants were benefitting from the slave trade triangle (slaves->sugar->rum). At the time of the American Revolution, slavery was legal in every Northern state. Of 21 prominent Founding Fathers, 14 of them at one time owned slaves, including such Northerners as John Hancock, John Jay, and Benjamin Franklin. The latter two later became officers in their states' antislavery societies. The Founders' failure to directly address the question of slavery exposed the hollowness of the words "all men created equal." Nonetheless, the underlying ideals of freedom and equality expressed in the document have inspired generations of Americans to struggle to obtain their inalienable rights. The 1619 Project, when it debuted, claimed that 1619 was the true founding of America. (By the way, the 20 African slaves who arrived in Jamestown in 1619 were originally destined for the Spanish colony of Veracruz when their ships were intercepted by English privateers.) This assertion has been vigorously attacked by prominent American historians who state that America, hitherto 13 separate colonies, was not formed into a united nation until 1776. America, an imperfect but great country, has strived toward a more perfect union.
